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2023 Team Tennis Tournament Format

A. QUALIFYING CRITERIA

1. A school must schedule and compete in a minimum of 50% of the season competition limits per Handbook Rule 34(10 contests) to be eligible for tournament play.
2. All team sports will qualify the top 32 teams by division.
3. Teams not power seeded in the top 32 but meeting 50% qualifying criteria will be eligible for the tournament.
4. Teams will be seeded by power ranking system.
5. The rest of the bracket positions will be filled with remaining teams using the MIAA Power Ranking system. After the top 32 teams are power seeded, the remaining teams with a 50% or better record will be seeded from the bottom of each bracket.

B. UNPLAYED MATCHES/NO CONTESTS

Schools will have an opportunity to appeal to the Seeding Committee if competitions deemed NO CONTESTS impact their ability to access the MIAA Tournament under the 50% qualifying criteria.

C. FORFEITED CONTESTS

When a forfeit win is awarded to a school due to the termination of their opponents' tennis program or failure to fulfill their contractual obligation, for power ranking purposes, the score will be entered as 3-0.

D. SEEDING/PAIRING ANNOUNCEMENT

1. Seeding is to be done by a Seasonal Seeding Committee. Members of the Seasonal Seeding Committee will include one chairperson (or designee) from each sport of current season, and 4 Tournament Management Committee members. Tournament Directors and Executive Liaisons will be present but are non-voting members. All decisions made by the Seasonal Seeding Committee are final. No appeals regarding seeding decisions will be allowed.
2. Seeding will be done by a power rating system:
 - Team's average margin of victory + average of opponents' ratings = overall rating
3. Tie Breaking Procedure (Seeding)
 - a) Head-to-head Competition
 - b) The higher average of each team's opponents' rating, based on the power rating formula.
 - c) League Champion
 - d) Coin flip
 - Only 2 teams tied – use coin flip
 - More than 2 teams, all team names will be put into a hat. Once team name is drawn, that team wins the tiebreaker. All other remaining teams will return to the first step of the Tie Breaking ProcedureIn a tie breaker for tournament seeding every match played including exclusion games, but excluding endowment games, are counted.
Note: If a tie involves multiple teams (more than 2) and a team is eliminated, the procedure starts over at the first step of the Tie Breaking Procedure with the remaining teams.
4. Pairings and tournament information will be available on the MIAA website, <http://www.miaa.net> throughout the tournament.
5. Tournament match results should be called in to the Tournament Administrator by the winning team, as soon as possible from the match site.

E. SITE INFORMATION

1. All matches will be at the home site of the higher seed for the Preliminary Round games, Round of 32, Round of 16, and Round of 8.
2. If the home site is not acceptable, the following will apply:
 - Home school AD finds an acceptable site
 - Lower seed will host the game



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- If both sites are not acceptable, the Tournament Administrator will place the game at an acceptable site within the MIAA site policy.
- 3. The MIAA will provide sites for State Semi-Finals (round of 4) and State Finals as defined by TMC Site Policy.
- 4. Home court venues must meet the following standards from the MIAA Handbook:
 - Condition of playing surface
 - Crowd Control
 - Seating Capacity
 - Locker Rooms
- 5. Tournament matches that are played at the site of the higher seed, should be played at a site that has a minimum of four courts. Courts must have proper nets (with center straps), and be in good condition, without cracks or weeds on them. If that is not the case, an alternate site will need to be secured.
- 6. Round of 4 and State Final sites will have at least five courts.
- 7. Playing sites shall be outdoors on courts of asphalt or asphalt consistency. Exception: In case of inclement weather, tournament matches, with mutual consent and at the expense of the host team, may be moved indoors, either before the start of play or at the time of a rain delay.
- 8. The athletic director or designee, other than the head coach, will serve as the site director and must be available for the duration of the match.

F. ASSIGNMENT OF TOURNAMENT OFFICIALS

The assigner will hire neutral roving USTA officials for the State Semi-Finals and State Finals.

G. SCHEDULING

1. The number of and equity in “rest” days is not a tournament scheduling criteria.

H. MEDICAL COVERAGE

It is the responsibility of each participating school to provide for the first aid/medical needs of its student-athletes through the State Semifinals.

The MIAA will hire medical personnel to be on hand at the State Finals.

I. GAME MANAGEMENT

1. Start Time - Teams are to arrive at designated playing site at least 15 minutes before starting time.
2. Dress - All players must be dressed in the official school uniform to participate. Failure of a player to comply will result in default.
3. Sportsmanship - The tournament director or his/her designee shall have the authority to default any player for unsportsmanlike conduct. Every effort will be made to have a warning precede any disqualification. However, a flagrant violation may result in immediate disqualification. This authority includes matches where officials are assigned.
4. Adverse Conditions or Postponements
 - a) In case of rain, only the tournament director/site director or official is responsible for the decision to play or not.
 - b) If rain occurs during a match, only the tournament director/site director or official will determine if match is to be continued.
 - c) Any decision regarding postponement will be made with player safety as the paramount consideration.
 - d) A suspended match shall resume at the exact point of suspension with the exact same line-ups.
 - e) Any change in the assigned site or time must be approved by the tournament director.
 - f) If rain dates have been exhausted and inclement weather occurs, permission to schedule indoor matches must first be obtained from the tournament director or MIAA Tennis Liaison, Richard Pearson.
 - g) PLEASE HELP! Schools are requested to bring extra roll-dri or squeegee(s).



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J. GAME BALLS

1. USTA approved *Extra Duty* optic yellow balls must be used. Regular Duty balls are not acceptable.
2. New balls will be used automatically for any match reaching a third set.
3. Each team must bring 10 unopened cans to every match.
 - a) Coaches should bring extra balls in case of a three set match, loss or damage.
 - b) The winner of each match receives an unopened can to use for the next round. If two cans have been opened, the winner receives two unopened cans of balls.

K. SCHOOL REPRESENTATIVE

1. All teams must be accompanied by the high school tennis coach(es) as identified on the official entry form.
2. The coach must remain at the tournament site until the completion of the entire match.
3. If the high school coach is unable to attend, the principal or athletic director may appoint an official school designee. Notification must be submitted prior to the event or presented to the tournament director when the players check in. Only the coach/official school designee may coach during the match. Only one coach at a time can coach a player. Personal coaches may not provide coaching at any time during the match or in between sets. At no time can a personal coach act as the school designee unless they are the official head or assistant coach of the team.
4. Failure to observe these rules will result in the team being defaulted.
5. The coach must bring a copy of the tournament format to the tournament site.

L. MATCH RULES

1. The rules of tennis as found in the 2021-2023 MIAA Handbook, this tournament format and USTA rules will be in effect for all matches.
2. Handbook Rule #81 must be strictly adhered to:
 - a) 1st and 2nd singles players and doubles teams must be played in order of ability.
 - b) Coaches must exchange the tournament line up justification form prior to the match and have the completed team ladder and challenge match results forms readily available upon request (see pg. 6- 9).
 - c) Failure to comply with this rule will result in match forfeiture of that team's point or points affected by the violation.
3. The last day a challenge match can be played is May 19, 2023.
4. If there is an issue regarding lineups, the issue must be resolved with both coaches and the tournament director prior to the start of play.
5. Handbook Rule #81.2.3 details how a match is to be played if one team has fewer than seven players.
6. Tie-Break - The 7 point tie break will be used in all matches when the set score reaches 6-6 in games. If the team match has been decided and an individual match is still in progress, in the event of split sets, there will be a three (3) minute break followed by a first-to-ten-by-two match tie-breaker. Players are not allowed to leave the court prior to the tie-breaker.
7. The first three games of each set will be played without a rest except for the change of ends after the first game. Coaching is allowed by the high school coach during odd game changeovers for one minute except after the first game of each set. Coaching is also allowed during the two (2) minute rest period at the end of each set, and before the start of the third set or super tiebreak. Coaches are not allowed on the playing surface.
8. In accordance with USTA Rules, a wheelchair tennis player is allowed two bounces of the ball. The second bounce can be in or out of the court boundaries.
9. The racquet spin is to be conducted before the ten minute warm-up period.
10. Play
 - a) USTA rules mandate a ten (10) minute player rest period when a match proceeds to a third set.
 - b) Play is to be continuous. No player may leave the court until the completion of his/her match. Players are not to leave the playing enclosure during the match except for a bathroom break and/or the mandated ten (10) minute break between the second and third set when applicable



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- c) Injury Time Out - as specified by the MIAA handbook (5 minutes), includes both evaluation and treatment.
 - d) USTA rules mandate while on court, or during a match, a player may not receive information via electronic devices capable of receiving communications such as cell phones and smartwatches.
 - e) In the event both teams are equally short-handed (i.e. both teams have 5 players or both teams have 6 players), only four matches will be played and the match could end in a 2-2 tie. The winning team will be the team that won the most sets. If this is a tie, the winning team will be the team that won the most games. If this is a tie, the last match to complete play, will play a super tiebreak (first player or team to win 10 points or more by a 2 point margin) to determine the winning team.
11. Line/Foot Fault Calls
 - a) Complaints concerning line calls or foot faults shall be made by a player to his/her coach.
 - b) It shall be the coach's decision to inform the tournament director of any concerns.
 - c) The tournament director shall inform the opposing coach and player of the concerns.
 - d) Upon request, the tournament director shall provide an arbitrator to monitor the match.
 - e) Students and/or coaches should not be asked to watch the lines.
 12. Protest - Per the MIAA Handbook (Rule 17), all results will be final when the contest has been concluded. There will be no protest after the fact.
 13. Code of Conduct - The MIAA and USTA Code of Conduct should be reviewed and will be followed throughout the tournament. Any incidents of unsportsmanlike behavior should be reported to the tournament director immediately.
 14. MIAA Drone Policy - Prohibiting the Use of Drones (Unmanned Aircraft Systems or UAS's)

Unless granted special permission by the MIAA Executive Director, the use of drones (UAS), for any purpose, is not permitted at any MIAA tournament event. This prohibition applies to all fields of play, courts, arena, mats, gym floor or pool, and covers a ban on the entire facility being used as part of the MIAA event, including the spectator stands and parking areas.

M. SAT/ACT SUBJECT TESTS:

1. Tournament matches may be scheduled for the afternoons of Saturday, June 3 and Saturday, June 10, the dates of the SAT and ACT exams. Please tell all coaches and student-athletes now, so alternative plans may be made. A listing of all dates and sports that may take place on scheduled College Board exam dates can be found on the MIAA website.
2. The College Board offers a SAT Program Alternate Test Date Policy. As stated in their published material: "The SAT Program will consider granting an alternate test date when the following criteria are met:
 - a) The conflicting event must be unexpected. Regularly scheduled sporting events or previously scheduled school activities, such as prom, are not considered unexpected. An event such as an academic or athletic competition, in which students have advanced through the competition or into post-regular season competition, can be considered an unexpected event.
3. SAT School Day: Allows high schools to administer the SAT to students during the school day, thus avoiding weekend athletic conflicts. To date, the MA school districts have participated are Plymouth, Springfield, Revere and most recently Fitchburg. SAT School Day is contracted through the College Board with participating districts.
